



### Health Care Legislation Affecting Low-Income Consumers as of June 15, 2020

Due to the pandemic and the ensuing economic recession, far fewer bills moved forward in the legislative process with many bills being held. Assembly Health and Senate Health only had one policy committee each, and for the first time, both houses have different timelines for moving out of the first house. The deadline for Assembly bills with a fiscal cost to get out of Appropriations is June 5 and deadline to get out of the first house is June 19, before beginning summer recess. Bills that did not make it out of Assembly Appropriations are not moving forward and have been marked "dead". The deadline for Senate bills with a fiscal cost to get out of Appropriations is June 19 and deadline to get out of the first house is June 26, before beginning summer recess. Following is a summary of bills in the Legislature that affect the health of low-income Californians.

SB 29	Durazo	Medi-Cal: eligibility.	Assembly Floor	This 2-year bill would expand full-scope Medi-Cal to all income-eligible adults regardless of immigration status, age 65 and above.	Support
SB 361	Mitchell	Medi-Cal: Health Homes Program.	2-Year Bill	This 2-year bill would remove restrictions around State funding and termination of Health Home Program after two years to eliminate perception that program is "pilot" and ensure chronically homeless individuals are targeted through partnership with homeless systems, enhanced outreach rate, and data collection. Cosponsors: Corporation for Supportive Housing, Housing California, and Western Center.	Co-Sponsor
SB 1029	Pan	Medi-Cal: County of Sacramento.	Assembly	This bill would establish a health authority in Sacramento County to create a Medi-Cal Oversight Commission to convene stakeholders to address Medi-Cal issues and help determine which plans may contract to provide Medi-Cal services in Sacramento County. AB 2025	Gipson	Mental illness and substance use disorder: restorative care program: pilot projects.	Senate	The bill would authorize the County of Los Angeles to establish a pilot project for up to 6 years to develop a restorative care program for community-based care and treatment that addresses the interrelated and complex needs of individuals suffering from mental illness and substance use disorder, along with other medical comorbidities, and homelessness.	
AB 3242	Irwin	Mental health: involuntary commitment.	Senate	Allows for telehealth for evaluations for 72-hour involuntary commitment ("5150 holds").	

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SB 803	Beall	Mental health services: peer support specialist certification.	Senate Appropriations	This bill would establish a statewide certification program for peer support specialists and provides the structure needed to maximize the federal match for peer services under Medi-Cal. SB 855	Wiener	Health coverage: mental health or substance abuse disorders.	Senate Appropriations	This bill would require a health plan that provides hospital, medical, or surgical coverage to provide coverage for the diagnosis and medically necessary treatment of mental health and substance use disorders under the same terms and conditions applied to other medical conditions. The bill would prohibit a health plan from limiting benefits or coverage for chronic or pervasive mental health and substance use disorders to short-term or acute treatment.	Support

AB 2276	Reyes	Medi-Cal: Blood lead screening tests.	Senate	This bill would require Medi-Cal plan contract to ensure lead testing requirements are met, require DHCS to monitor and report blood lead screening tests for all enrolled children annually on its website, and notify and educate parents and providers of missed screening.	Support

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AB 2277	Salas	Medi-Cal: Blood lead screening tests.	Senate	This bill would require Medi-Cal plans to identify every enrollee who does not have a record of completing blood lead tests and remind the provider of the need to perform those tests. The bill would also require DHCS to notify parents or guardians if their child has missed a required blood lead test as part of a annual preventive services notification.	Support
AB 2279	Garcia, Cristina	Childhood lead poisoning prevention.	Senate	This bill would add risk factors to be considered as part of the standard of care for child who are at risk for lead poisoning, including a child's residency in a high-risk ZIP Code. This bill would also require the Department of Public Health to update its formula for allocating funds to local agencies that administers the Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program.	Support

Senate	This bill would provide important consumer protections for Medi-Cal enrollees receiving prescription drugs in the fee-for-service delivery system, including access to independent medical review, continuity of care, and other protections.	<b>Co-Sponsor</b>
SB 852	Pan	Health care: prescription drugs.	Senate Appropriations	Would establish the Office of Drug Contracting and Manufacturing within the California Health and Human Services Agency to, among other things, increase patient access to affordable drugs. The bill would require the office, on or before January 1, 2022, to contract or partner with at least one drug company or generic drug manufacturer to produce at least 10 generic prescription drugs, as determined by the office, and insulin at a price that results in savings. The bill would require the office to prepare and submit a report to the Legislature on or before January 1, 2022, that, among other things, assesses the feasibility of the office to directly manufacture generic prescription drugs and includes an estimate of the cost of building or acquiring manufacturing capacity. AB 3052	Carrillo	Forced or Involuntary Sterilization Compensation Program.	<b>DEAD</b>	Establishes the Forced or Involuntary Sterilization Compensation Program to provide compensation to survivors of state-sponsored sterilization conducted pursuant to eugenics laws that existed in California between 1909 and 1979 and to survivors of coerced sterilizations of people in prisons after 1979.	
SB 1237	Dodd	Nurse-midwives: scope of practice.	Senate Appropriations	Removes the requirement for physician supervision for nurse midwives to improve birth equity outcomes.	Support

Senate	This bill would create the E-Consult Services and Telehealth Assistance Program within DHCS to award grants to health center-controlled networks, health centers, and rural health clinics to conduct projects to implement and test the effectiveness of e-consult services and related telehealth services.	
AB 2360	Maienschein	Telehealth: mental health.	Senate	This bill would require DHCS to establish a pilot project to provide psychiatry doctor-to-doctor consults on pediatric and maternal mental health. Cosponsors: 2020 Mom and Maternal Mental Health Now.

Senate	Would require a hospital that provides emergency medical services to provide public notice at least 180 days before a planned reduction or elimination of the level of emergency medical services or closure of the the facility and at least 90 days prior to eliminating or relocating a supplemental service.	
AB 2077	Ting	Hypodermic needles and syringes.	Senate	This bill would allow pharmacists to provide sterile syringes as part of the state's approach to prevent the spread of HIV, hepatitis B and hepatitis C as well as decriminalizes the possession of syringes for personal use.	Support
AB 2218	Santiago	Transgender Wellness and Equity Fund.	Senate	Establishes the Transgender Wellness and Equity Fund for grants to transgender-led nonprofit organizations and medical providers that provide gender-conforming health care services or have an established partnership with a transgender-led nonprofit organization, to fund programs focused on coordinating trans-inclusive medical care, behavioral health care, and social services.	Support
AB 2377	Chiu	Adult residential facilities: closures and resident transfers.	Senate	This bill would create more stringent closure requirements for Adult Residential Facilities.
